Christ in Genesis

One of the most beautiful allusions to Christ in all of the Old Testament is found in Genesis 22. Many parallels can be found between Isaac and Jesus: Isaac was Abraham's beloved and only son; Jesus was God's only and beloved Son. Abraham and Isaac travelled



three days; Jesus spent three days in the grave. The mountain Isaac was "offered" on would later be the location of Solomon's temple (2 Chr. 3:1), and in the proximity of where Jesus would one day be crucified. Most important is Abraham's statement to Isaac in verse 8, "My son, God will provide for Himself the lamb for a burnt offering." God did provide a ram that day which took Isaac's place, but Abraham's words foreshadowed something far greater-the time when God would provide His Son Jesus, the perfect Lamb of God, in order to take away our sins!

Genesis 12-26 Abraham: A Friend of God

Overview

In Genesis 12, the Biblical focus shifts from telling the story of the world to the story of a single man. This was no ordinary man however, and the shift doesn't mean God was done with the world. On the contrary, by shifting focus to Abraham, the story of God's redemptive plan narrows in on the man through whom the whole world would be blessed! God called Abram out of his homeland and to the Friday: Gen. 24-26 land of Canaan, and God promised to make

Abram into a great nation. One apparent problem existed: Abram and his wife Sarai were already pretty old, and childless. As we follow the story of Abram we follow a man growing in his walk with God. We see mistakes, but we see incredible faith. We also see God make His covenant with Abram, and we see God's power to fulfill amazing promises. In their old age (and 25 years after God's original call) Abraham and Sarah were blessed with the birth of Isaac, the child God had promised them. Abraham's life is a wonderful example of what it means to trust in God and obey Him. James 2:23 even says of this great man, "...and he was called the friend of God." What a wonderful compliment! Let us learn from this man, and seek to be more like him so that we too can be the friends of God!
