The Transformed Life

After Paul calls Christian's to be living sacrifices, he says, "Do not be conformed to this world, but be transformed by the renewal of your mind..." As Christians, we should be different than the world. We should act different, speak different, and in some ways even look different! We often prefer to blend in with the crowd, but conformity is not the path of Christianity. Instead of conforming, Paul tells us to "be transformed." The Greek word Paul uses is *metamorphoo.* We don't have to know Greek to recognize that word probably. It is the word from which we get our English word "metamorphosis." The change in a Christian from their previous life should be as drastic as the change of a caterpillar to a butterfly! As we crucify the old man of sin and are raised to newness of life (remember chapter 6),

we become radically different. We are transformed! That process of change begins in the very way we think, thus, "the renewal of the mind." Instead of thinking of our own interests, our minds are focused on God and His will. If that's the case, our actions, words, and entire lives will take a new shape. Such a transformation will impact our relationships with other Christians, even when we disagree (Rom. 12 and 14). It will impact how we serve the governments we live under (13), and the work we do in Christ (15-16). Here's some questions to ponder: how different is your life from what it used to be? How different is your life than the lives of worldly people? What is your relationship with other Christians like? Have you conformed, or have you been transformed?
