The Sacrifices

Sacrifices were a major part of the Old Testament, even before the Law of Moses was given. When God gave the Law, however, He laid out the instructions of sacrifice that would govern His people until the final sacrifice was made at the cross. The sacrifices of the Old Testament pointed forward to the death of Jesus, who became the perfect sacrifice for sin, a sacrifice made once for all (Heb. 10:10).

Leviticus 1-13 Sacrifice and Worship

Overview

I've often joked that Leviticus is the place where Bible reading plans go to die. Many well-intentioned Bible students have breezed through the narratives of Genesis and Exodus, only to bog down and finally quit in the book of Leviticus. On the surface, this book can be daunting, difficult, and dare we say, boring? It is not written in a narrative style; it is repetitive; and all the talk of blood, animal sacrifices, and priests seems far removed and foreign to us. So why not just skip Leviticus? Because (1) it is part of

God's Word, and (2) it is a very important and helpful book! When we take the time to delve deeper into Leviticus, I believe we can all come away with a greater appreciation of the book itself, the Old Testament, God's plan, and Jesus!

In many ways, Leviticus is the foundation of Hebrew history, because it is the Law given to the nation. How the Jews worshiped and lived is a focal point throughout the Old Testament. Both holy living and worship are the focal point of Leviticus, and thus it is much more than a book of rules—it is a book that defined holiness for the Israelites. God's desire is that His children be holy, like He is holy (19:2). Thus, we can learn a great deal about holiness in this book. Most importantly, Leviticus shows us the terrible price of sin (the requirement of blood and sacrifice is a major part of the Law), and thus it also teaches us about the sacrifice of Christ. If passages about various sacrifices seem tedious and difficult, remember that they point towards Jesus, and thus teach us something of the Lord's gift to us on the cross!

Strange Fire

Leviticus chapter 10 contains the one section of narrative in the book, and what a warning it provides! Nadab and Abihu, sons of

Aaron, were killed by God when they offered "strange," that is "unauthorized" fire. This tragic story demonstrates the seriousness of worship, and the danger of supposing we can worship God how we choose instead of as He has commanded!
