

## **Be Strong and Courageous!**

The book of Joshua opens with a conversation between God and Joshua. Moses was dead, and now it was time for Joshua to lead the nation. Talk about big shoes to fill! While Joshua had a monumental challenge in front of him, it was no time to become afraid. When God spoke to Joshua, He emphasized three times that Joshua was to be strong and courageous:

"Be strong and of good courage" (Joshua 1:6)

"Be strong and very courageous" (Joshua 1:7)

"Be strong and of good courage; do not be afraid, nor be dismayed" (Joshua 1:9) Along with these exhortations we also find important keys to finding strength and courage.

Remember God's Promises: Joshua could be strong, because the Lord promised to be with him as He had been with Moses. In times of weakness, remember God's promises to the faithful.

Obey God: God reminded Joshua to "do according to all the law .... do not turn from it to the right hand or to the left, that you may have good success." As long as we are obeying God, we can find strength and courage.

Do Not Depart from the Word: To obey God, we must know His will. Joshua was told to meditate on the law day and night. If we seek strength and courage, we should read and study the Word of God diligently!


