Psalms 120-150 **Psalms: Book 5 Continued**

Overview

This week you will complete your reading of the Psalms! As with most of the Psalms in book 5 (Ps. 107-150), the Psalms you'll read this week are heavily focused on praise and Monday: Psalms 120-129 thanksgiving. This is one of the most exuberant and joyful sections of the Psalms. The reading this week begins with a section often called "The Psalms of Ascent" and it contains several other Psalms of praise and Friday: Psalm 145-150 worship. The final handful of Psalms are praise songs that burst with praise towards

God. These Psalms explore the many reasons God's children have to praise His name, and remind readers today of how much they have to be thankful for, and how worthy God truly is of our unceasing praise! As the final verse of Psalms says, "Let everything that has breath praise the Lord! Praise the Lord!"



Going Up: The Psalms of Ascent

Psalms 120-134 comprises a special section of the Psalms often called the "Psalms of Ascent" or "Psalms of Degrees." This heading is a translation of the Hebrew term ma'alot which means "goings up." There is some debate about what these Psalms were used for. There are a few who believe the "going up" refers to the step-like rhythm or tone of the Psalms. More often, it is supposed that these Psalms were a part of a journey or worship

practice. Some believe they were sung by Jews that were returning to Jerusalem after the Babylonian captivity. Several historians and commentators believe that these psalms were sung by the priests as they traversed the 15 steps leading up to the temple. Most commonly, it is believed that Jews sang these songs as they travelled from their home towns to Jerusalem to observe the three feasts that men were required to attend every year according to the Law of Moses. Whatever the case, it seems clear that these Psalms were very special to the Jewish people, and tied closely to their worship. This section of the Psalms is worthy of extra reading and special study. It explores important topics such as trusting in God, longing to go home, the joy of worshipping God, and the attitudes of those who reverently and obediently worship the Creator.

These songs served a special purpose in preparing the mind of the lews for worship. Today, we should remember that songs of praise are not just for our entertainment. Spiritual songs play an important role in preparing our minds for worship, and "psalms, hymns, and spiritual songs" are a form of teaching one another. Lifting up songs of praise to God help us remember our own upward journey to Heaven!



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
