Acts 10-18 The Gospel Spreads

Overview

In the first section of Acts, we saw the church begin in Jerusalem and start to grow. As the church grew and persecution intensified, Christians began spreading out from Jerusalem, but they took the Monday: Acts 10-11 gospel message with them. Evangelists like Philip Tuesday: Acts 12-13 also shared the gospel in regions beyond Jerusalem, and the church was spreading just as Jesus commanded it should. This week we read of Thursday: Acts 16 continued expansion of the church. Peter is sent to Friday: Acts 17-18 the first Gentile converts, opening the gospel to all people. Saul of Tarsus, the once-persecutor of the

church, will become the main character for much of the rest of Acts, spreading the gospel throughout the world. The book of Acts is a fascinating and interesting historical narrative, but it is also very helpful for Christians today. In Acts, we see how the Gospel is preached, how devoted Christians should be to faithfulness no matter the cost, and we see several examples of conversion. All these things help us as we seek to live faithfully, and as we strive to share the gospel and convert lost souls today.
